Household bin collections

The Council's household bin collection service are currently taking place as normal. We are continuing to monitor the situation, along with government guidance.

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Disposing of waste from households with possible cases of coronavirus (COVID-19)

Waste from households with possible cases of coronavirus (COVID-19), or from cleaning of areas where possible cases have been (including disposable cloths and tissues), should be dealt with as follows:

- Place all waste in a plastic rubbish bag and tie it when full.
- The plastic bag should then be placed in a second bin bag and tied.
- The bag should be put in a suitable and secure place, away from children, for 72 hours
- After waste has been stored for 72 hours it can be placed in the normal general waste bin

Please do not put your waste in communal waste areas until negative test results are known or the waste has been stored for at least 72 hours.

Closure of Household Waste Recycling Sites

All Household Waste Recycling Sites (HWRS) across West Sussex are now closed until further notice due to the current COVID-19 situation.

This is to reinforce the need for social distancing, protecting staff and highway safety. West Sussex County Council will issue guidance on disposal of excess waste, with the focus on vulnerable and elderly residents in the first instance.
