D-Day 75: West Sussex people played their role

A West Sussex man, whose invention helped make the D-Day landings possible, is just one of the stories in a new edition of a book produced by West Sussex Record Office.

'D-Day West Sussex' explains how Lieutenant-Commander Robert Lochner, RNVR, experimented in the garden pond at his home at Linchmere near Midhurst to create 'floating sea walls' (Mulberry Harbours) which allowed supply lorries and other support vehicles to land safely on the Normandy beaches.

The book is available at the Record Office in Orchard Street, Chichester and from all public libraries in West Sussex.



Visitors to the Record Office will also be able to read the diary of a General, written just days before D-Day.

This, along with other significant documents, is on display in the reception area. In the diary General Lashmer Gordon Whistler of the Royal Sussex Regiment, described how he felt before D-Day: "A very strange feeling being in England waiting for the final campaign to start."

"I hope I am not going to be too frightened."

Whistler took command of the 3rd Infantry Division for the final push from Normandy to Bremen in Germany.

The book priced at £7.95.

Rare Sussex Declaration displayed during US Presidential State Visit to UK

West Sussex County Council is delighted that the Sussex Declaration – a rare copy of the American Declaration of Independence – has been displayed in No 10 Downing Street during the Presidential State Visit to the UK.

The Declaration is one of only two contemporary handwritten ceremonial parchment manuscript copies, the other being the signed copy housed in the National

West Sussex County Archivist Wendy Walker delivered a short presentation to Prime Minister Theresa May and President Donald Trump about the document and its historical significance.

Great efforts were taken to transport the document from the Record Office in Chichester to Downing Street this week. A conservation expert from the National Conservation Service was involved and a specially-designed exhibition case, previously used for the Magna Carta, was loaned by Hereford Cathedral Perpetual Trust to display the historic document.

Speed kills West Sussex Fire & Rescue Service warns



West Sussex Fire & Rescue Service is urging residents to cut their speed as part of speeding prevention month.

Last year, eight people died and 123 were seriously injured on West Sussex roads due to speeding.

A new video made by the service highlights these statistics and also features the voice of a young child asking his father why he is driving so fast.

Being caught speeding could result in:


- Up to six points on your licence
- Fine of up to 175% of your weekly income
- Driving ban or licence revoked (if you're still within two years of passing your test)
- Disqualification
- Criminal record
- Prison sentence
- The death or serious injury of either yourself or an innocent person.
