
Dear Mr. Chipp

The Public Footpath at Nuthurst Street

This footpath may seem an insignificant matter to planners, but local people are angered by Mr Burnham's repeated and deliberate flouting of regulations, including here at the public footpath in Nuthurst Street. To retain public respect the Parish Council suggests that HDC needs to be seen by the public to take firm and clear action to ensure that this footpath is returned as near as possible to its original rural appearance, as shown below.

In March 2020, at a site meeting between Mr Chipp, staff from HDC, WSCC Highways, PROW and Countryside, the District Councillor and the Parish Council agreed a specification for the return of the unlawfully constructed roadway to the field at its rear, to its former appearance as a green footpath. This included amongst other measures, the removal of the tarmac hardstanding, the kerbstones and the laying of a plastic Core Grass system to a maximum width of 2.5 metres.

As events have unfolded since March 2020, it appears that Mr Burnham has negotiated various "variations" to the specification behind the back of the Parish Council and without its knowledge. This is unacceptable, given that the Parish Council was originally involved in the matter.

Consequently, the public footpath now has an urban appearance, as shown in the photo above. This was not the objective of the original enforcement order dating back to January 2018 or the specification agreed in March 2020.

Following work carried out by Mr Burnham, the public footpath now has a solid surface that is 2.7m wide, has kerbstones along its full length, the full depth of the tarmac has not been removed and electricity services have been laid under the ground along the southern edge. In the opinion of the Parish Council, all this non-compliance is a precursor to Mr Burnham submitting a second, planning application to build houses over the field to the rear of the public footpath. This is a field that Mr Chipp said at a Parish Council meeting was a "red zone" as far as he was concerned.

The Parish Council trusts that the HDC's enforcement team will be clear and firm in requiring Mr Burnham to remove all of the tarmac and the kerbstones and retaining concrete. Otherwise, in our increasingly dry summers, the grass will not survive and the oak trees that the specification requires him to plant will have their root systems deprived of the moisture needed for their healthy growth and will likely die.

The Parish Council is asking HDC to be clear and firm in requiring Mr Burnham to comply exactly with all the specifications contained in the specifications dating to March 2020, even though this will require him to undo work he has already carried out. The non-compliance is not accidental but deliberate and the public needs to see that HDC will deal with developers who will not honour the rules.
