

Active steps taken to encourage travel rethink



As schools, parents and pupils start the autumn term in West Sussex, we're encouraging everyone to think about the school run.

We're also encouraging college and university students, together with the wider travelling public, to rethink how they travel.

By taking small steps and thinking active travel first, many people could have the opportunity to make their journeys greener, healthier, safer and more active.

As part of this Department for Transport-funded work, we will be engaging with both schools and the wider public, and sharing key messages, to try to ensure school journeys can run as smoothly as possible.

We're also:

- Encouraging schools to develop their own travel plans to promote active and sustainable travel choices for school journeys
- Helping parents, carers and pupils/students to think about more active and sustainable transport options for the school run, where possible
- Considering a range of different measures and initiatives to encourage parents and carers to think active travel first for the school run, and make journeys greener, healthier, safer and more active

Joy Dennis, the County Council's Cabinet Member for Highways and Transport, said: "The Covid-19 pandemic and lockdowns have presented us all with significant challenges, but we've also seen that many residents across West Sussex have made lots of extremely positive changes, particularly in terms of how they get around.

"Many have rediscovered the benefits of active travel choices, such as walking and cycling, for more journeys in their local area, or simply getting outdoors and active every day. We want to encourage these positive changes, and help residents to make journeys greener, healthier, safer and more active, particularly for the school run."

Deborah Urquhart, Cabinet Member for Environment and Climate Change, said: "Active travel is one of the themes we've identified to focus on as part of our climate change work. Transport is one of the main contributors to emissions in West Sussex, so I welcome initiatives, such as this, that encourage people to rethink their transport choices if possible."

We'll also be posting further updates and exciting new campaign content on our social media channels across Facebook, Twitter and Instagram.

A 'school gate' travel improvement programme is also being developed by the County Council as part of its [Active Travel initiatives](#). Proposed improvements will help to reduce reliance on cars, protect school bus travel and promote active travel.

Proposals include:

- a new Toucan crossing on the A283 in Shoreham to support active travel journeys to and from Sir Robert Woodard Academy
  - a new signalised crossing adjacent to The Gatwick School, Gatwick Road, Crawley
  - upgrading the signalised crossing on B2116 Keymer Road, Hassocks to a Toucan crossing and providing a shared cycleway footway on Dale Avenue to support active travel to Downlands School. This is part of a wider scheme which is devised to improve cycling provision from Sayers Common to Hassocks.
  - safety training for students who missed out on training during lockdowns via [Bikeability courses](#)
  - targeted one-to-one training for adults wanting to improve their cycling confidence

#### **AGAR returns**

While it is good that 97% of local (parish and town) councils have submitted their Annual Governance and Accountability Return (AGAR), that still leaves 276 local councils who haven't. And for parish meetings, 84% have so far made their returns, which leaves 202 still outstanding. You can read more about the consequences of not completing the return on the Smaller Authorities Audit Appointments website [here](#). In addition to the extra costs incurred, not meeting these statutory deadlines does not help the sector's reputation. So if you have not done so already, please submit your AGAR as soon as possible – thank you!

#### **NALC consultations update**

Responding to consultations from the government and others is one way we seek to influence the policy agenda and ensure the sector's voice gets heard. We recently responded to the House of Lords Inquiry into Demand For New Housing and are

currently finalising our response to the Ministry of Housing, Communities and Local Government (MHCLG) Technical Local Audit consultation. We're currently seeking your views on the Cabinet Office consultation on a National Resilience Strategy, so please email your responses to this consultation to [chris.borg@nalc.gov.uk](mailto:chris.borg@nalc.gov.uk) by 10 September. And lastly, we will be responding to the Department for the Environment, Food and Rural Affairs (DEFRA) consultation on Local Nature Strategies, so keep an eye out for the NALC briefing that next week. Pet theft taskforce recommendations welcomed**

Having sat on the Pet Theft Taskforce earlier this year I was pleased to see its report published yesterday with some key recommendations.

The new pet abduction offence will reassure owners that Government and police take pet theft seriously.

I am delighted that the Taskforce recognises how pets are more like family members than property for most owners and the emotional impact of having a pet stolen is a driving factor in proposing a specific offence of abduction.



Yesterday I was delighted to introduce the Sussex Rural Crime team to DEFRA Secretary of State George Eustice MP to launch the Pet Theft Taskforce report.

He commented that “reports of a rise in pet theft have been worrying. Pet owners shouldn’t have to live in fear and I am pleased this report acknowledges the unique distress caused by this crime”.

Inspector Oli Fisher and Sergeant Tom Carter talked the Secretary of State through recent operations into dog theft and puppy farming, highlighting the enormous sums of money criminals were making with desperate families handing over sometimes thousands of pounds in cash to secure a puppy.

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#### Dedicated to tackling crimes including dog theft

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DC Sharon Rintoul gave an update on a case following the recovery of 10 dogs by detectives from Crawley with ongoing work to identify their owners whilst a suspect has been released under investigation.

Other key recommendations in the Taskforce report will see the Home Office work with police to ensure pet thefts are recorded in a consistent way with data more easily shared across forces and through the Criminal Justice System. There will also be improvements to the recording of pet ownership and transfer of ownership with more information stored on the current 16 dog microchip databases, creating a single point of data access.

The Taskforce’s recommendations are part of the Government’s plans to make the UK a global leader in animal welfare with new measures to tackle illegal smuggling of dogs and puppies.

I am very grateful to our farm owner hosts for allowing ACC Jayne Dando and Sussex Police to showcase the Rural Crime team and for welcoming the DEFRA visitors. Sussex residents can be reassured that they have a dedicated unit committed to tackling wildlife, heritage, environmental and agricultural crime, dog theft and animal exploitation.

## Ensuring a safe return to education

Schools and colleges are reopening from today (Thursday 2 September) and we've put together all the information parents, carers and pupils need to know to ensure a safe return to learning.



This includes what Covid-19 measures have been put in place at schools and how schools manage outbreaks, a section aimed at how young people can keep themselves and others safe and still enjoy life, and advice and guidance on mental health and wellbeing.

All pupils will be expected to attend school or college as normal, provided they do not have Covid-19 or are showing any symptoms of it.

Secondary and college-aged pupils are asked to take two tests at their school when they return. However, pupils who have tested positive on a PCR test in the last 90 days should not participate in the return to school testing, because it could show a false positive result.

University students will also be returning over the next few weeks and should ensure they've had their vaccinations and test before they go back.

## Testing, testing - it's still vital



It's vital to keep testing ourselves for coronavirus.

If you haven't taken a lateral flow coronavirus test before or you'd rather not do it yourself you can have one at a local pharmacy. Trained staff will be happy to assist with a test which will involve a swab of your nose and throat. You'll receive the results by text. Visit our [website](#) to find a list of participating pharmacies in West Sussex. This is a drop-in service but we recommend you book first. This service is only available if you **do not** have coronavirus symptoms.

## Vaccination update

Most adults in West Sussex are now vaccinated, but if you are yet to have yours or know anyone who hasn't, then check out details of [walk-in clinics](#) or [how to book](#) an appointment.

It's really important for young people going to university in the autumn to get their jabs before they go.

Young people aged 16 and 17 can also have a vaccine now (and eligible 12-15 year olds too). They'll be contacted to book an appointment or can attend some walk-in clinics. Find out more and read frequently asked questions [here](#).

As of Tuesday 31 August **645,687** people over 18 in West Sussex have had one dose of the vaccine. That's 86.2% of the population.



## Book a chimney sweep to prevent fire



Last year West Sussex Fire & Rescue Service attended 77 chimney fires across the county.

Therefore, as part of the [Chimney Fire Safety Week campaign](#), the service is urging residents to get their chimneys swept before the cold weather sets in.

Fire services across the country see a large increase in the number of chimney fires they attend during the winter months. This is because they have not been kept clean and are not safe to use.

Other chimney fire safety tips include:

- using fire or spark guards
- always extinguishing the fire before going to bed or leaving the house
- never blocking air bricks, vents or flues
- always fitting a carbon monoxide detector and smoke alarm - it could save your life.

## Interested in solar panels? Solar Together Sussex scheme is now open

We have launched a second round of the Solar Together Sussex scheme to help our residents reduce their carbon emissions and energy costs by fitting solar panels to their home.

The group buying scheme brings households together to install high quality solar panels and battery systems at a competitive price.

You can register for free and without obligation.



If you already have solar panels, you can register to have a battery storage system added so you can get the most out of the clean energy you generate.

Here's how it works:

- **Registration** – the homeowner registers their interest in the scheme free of charge and without obligation. They provide some basic information about their roof, such as its size and orientation.
- **Auction** – a supplier 'auction' will be held on 28 September when approved solar installers will bid to supply solar panels to all the households who have registered their interest, with the most competitive bid winning. The more people that register, the better the deal should be for each household.
- **Personal recommendation** - from the start of October, those who have signed up will be emailed a personal recommendation and quote from the winning supplier. This is based on the roof details given during registration.
- **Decision:** Those who have signed up to the scheme will then need to decide if they want to accept the recommendation and quote. There is no obligation to continue. They will have until 26 November 2021 to decide.
- **Installation:** If the recommendation and quote is accepted, the winning supplier will be in contact to survey the roof and set an installation date.




Walking routes will be both around quiet roads and on local tracks - a good pair of trainers is all you need!



#### Teenager suffers potentially life-changing injuries in Horsham collision

Police are appealing for witnesses to a collision in Horsham in which a teenager suffered potentially life-changing injuries.

Officers were called to reports of a collision on the A24 Dorking Road, Horsham, at around 9.30am on Tuesday (August 24).

A white Ford Fiesta carrying two people was travelling southbound before leaving the carriageway and hit a house.

The passenger, an 18-year-old woman from Bolney, suffered potentially life-changing facial injuries and was taken to hospital by air ambulance.

The driver, an 18-year-old woman, from West Ashling, near Chichester, was arrested on suspicion of causing serious injury by dangerous driving and for driving a motor vehicle while above the alcohol limit.

She was released under investigation while enquiries continue.

It's time to get your popcorn - West Sussex Record Office and Screen Archive South East are back with another fantastic live episode of West Sussex Unwrapped.

Showing on a screen near you at 7pm on Tuesday 14 September, this free event tells the fascinating story of West Sussex cinemas.

From the arrival of the travelling showmen in the late 1890s to the opening of the first dedicated cinemas in the 1910s, this new technology and entertainment changed every high street in the county.

Using films from the Screen Archive South East collections, the cinema historian and director of Screen Archive South East, Dr Frank Gray will lead the talk, focusing on three West Sussex cinemas:

- The Corn Exchange / Granada Cinema in Chichester – which first showed a film in 1896
- The Whitehall Cinema in East Grinstead – which opened on London Road in 1910
- The Heath Cinema in Haywards Heath – which opened on The Broadway in 1911

Duncan Crow, West Sussex County Council Cabinet Member for Community Support, Fire and Rescue, said: "The topics that have been focused on in series two of West Sussex Unwrapped have been incredibly interesting. Many West Sussex residents will remember the days of heading to their local

cinema and watching newsreels and films. This live event will bring those memories back to life, while giving viewers a ‘behind the curtains’ look at the rich and vibrant history of the county.

“By introducing these live events which people can watch from the comfort of their own home, we are bringing the archives of West Sussex Record Office and Screen Archive South East to members of the public who wouldn’t necessarily be able to come over to Chichester and visit in person.”

The evening will be introduced by Wendy Walker, West Sussex County Archivist, and there will be an opportunity to ask questions via the chat box after the talk.

Dr Frank Gray, Director of Screen Archive South East and the host of the live event, said: “We often think that cinema history is only about the films – what’s on screen – but it is also about the cinemas themselves and their social and commercial histories. I’m looking forward to introducing the history of West Sussex cinemas at this special live event.”

## Notes to Editor

### Screen Archive South East – who are they and what do they do?

Screen Archive South East (SASE) is a publicly funded regional film archive and has served this region of England ever since it was established in 1992 by the University of Brighton in association with the West Sussex Record Office, the British Film Institute and a consortium of the region’s record offices.

SASE is dedicated to collecting, preserving, digitising, cataloguing and providing public and commercial access to their film, videotape, magic lantern slide and digital file collections. Its collection of over 25,000 lantern slides and moving images documents the rise of screen culture in the region and represents primarily the changing nature of life in the South East from the late 19th century to the

present day. Its Conservation Centre and climate-controlled vault are located at the West Sussex Record Office at Chichester and in 2009 the archive was recognised by the BFI as a significant UK film collection.

SASE is always on the look-out for new films to add to their public collection, be they films, videotapes or digital files. It welcomes potential donors and depositors to get in touch to discuss their films and the ways in which these moving image treasures can be preserved for future generations to enjoy.

### **West Sussex Record Office – who are they and what do they do?**

West Sussex Record Office looks after the historical archives of the county of West Sussex and makes them accessible for people to explore and carry out research. The Record Office takes in archives, including digital records, on a regular basis and currently holds over eight miles of records dating back over 1,200 years. These include the archives of local government, the Cathedral and Diocese of Chichester and its parishes and the records of businesses, families, estates, societies and schools. The Record Office also holds the records of West Sussex hospitals, the West Sussex Constabulary and The Royal Sussex Regiment. Together they tell the fascinating story of the people, places and events in the county and provide current and future generations with a source of inspiration and an ever-growing body of fascinating material to discover.

West Sussex Record Office was set up in 1946 and is part of West Sussex County Council. It is an Accredited Archive Service that is licensed as a Place of Deposit for public records by The National Archives. The purpose-built archive centre in Chichester houses environmentally controlled strong rooms to ensure the long-term preservation of the collections, a conservation workshop, a digitisation studio and a public search room where people can come to use the collections.

West Sussex Record Office works with a wide variety of partners and stakeholders including Screen Archive South East, whose collections compliment and link into the West Sussex archives in many intriguing and exciting ways.

Buying or selling a used car, van, truck, bike or other motor vehicle online has always carried risks.

But conditions brought about by the COVID-19 pandemic – such as rising prices, limited availability and restrictions to travel and accompanied test drives – have created new excuses for fraudsters to deceive you, whether you're buying or selling.

Let's work together to make it safer

There have always been risks associated with buying or selling a vehicle online. But recent increases in used car prices, limited availability of some models and restrictions to travel and accompanied test drives have created additional risks, giving fraudsters new excuses to deceive both buyers and sellers.

*How can you tell what ads, vehicles, buyers and sellers are genuine?*

Safe buying

### **Paying a deposit**

If a deposit is requested or agreed, don't pay more than you are willing to lose and confirm with the seller that they will refund the deposit if you don't purchase the vehicle. Be wary of requests for up-front transportation fees, it could be a scam.

### **Always view the vehicle before paying the full amount**

Research the seller as well as their vehicle. Try to ascertain that the vehicle actually exists. Most fraudulent sellers will try to persuade you to transfer money before you've even had sight of the vehicle, citing any one of a number of excuses. Often, they will insist on communicating only via email rather than on the phone.

### **Check that the price of the vehicle is in line with the market value**

If the price, condition, specification or mileage of the vehicle seems too good to be true, that could indeed be the case. Research other similar vehicles or perform a free valuation on AutoTrader. If the vehicle is below market value, think twice. Ask the seller questions about its valuation, there may be genuine underlying reasons if the vehicle is under-priced.

### **Take the vehicle for a test drive**

Thoroughly inspect any vehicle you are looking to purchase, and take it for a test drive. This should always be done from the seller's premises or their home; never let the person meet you by the roadside or any other random location. Also, consider an inspection by the AA, RAC or other reputable organisation offering the service.

### **Carry out a vehicle history check and inspection**

This will tell you if the vehicle is recorded as stolen, written off, scrapped, or has outstanding finance. It's not worth the risk buying a vehicle that could be unroadworthy or worth a fraction of what you're paying for it. Check the service history and ask to see historic MOT certificates to check that the milometer hasn't been adjusted. Make sure you know your statutory rights regarding quality and refunds, before parting with any money.

### **Making payment**

Never send money for a vehicle you haven't seen. Don't carry large amounts of cash. Consider paying by bank transfer or credit card (if the seller offers the facility).

## **Safe Selling**

### **Be prepared**

Have all the relevant paperwork together, such as the V5C, service history and MOT certificate, for a potential buyer to review. Buyers may wish to check details such as the address on the V5C and the mileage in the most recent MOT certificate. Never let the buyer photograph your documents, in case the request is fraudulent.

### **Beware of scammers**

Always meet the buyer. Request their contact details, such as their phone number and full home address, and proof of identity – a driving licence is ideal. This should give you

further reassurances, and a legitimate buyer should be happy to provide this information.

### **Test drive advice**

Make sure you ask the buyer to bring their driving licence and proof of insurance if they want to test drive the vehicle. Check their level of insurance to test drive, this should prevent you having to pay out for damages.

### **Never allow a buyer to test drive the vehicle alone**

Never leave a potential buyer alone with the vehicle, nor give them the keys. If you have a keyless ignition fob, keep hold of it at all times, even on a test drive. Be aware that this type of vehicle is becoming increasingly stolen by thieves who only need to be near the fob and not actually in possession, you can buy a special pouch to protect this occurring. Never jeopardise your personal safety and if you feel uncomfortable at any time, walk away.

### **Stay on home ground**

Always arrange to meet a buyer at your home; never meet at the roadside or at their premises.

### **Taking payment**

Never release the vehicle until you have confirmation of cleared funds. If you accept a cheque or banker's draft for payment, be aware it can take days for funds to clear.



Gatwick 2, rebuilding the emergency runway as a second runway as it has to be rebuilt 12m north with about 28 new taxiways going outside of the Gatwick boundary) would take annual flights to a staggering **382,000 a year** (from pre-Covid 285,000). Gatwick seeks to maximise throughput early morning and evening with two runways.

It is anticipated that by 2038, this expansion could increase passenger throughput to approximately 75.6 mppa million (passengers per annum), compared to a maximum expected capacity (based on existing runway) of approximately 62.4 mppa within the same timescale without the Northern Runway Project.
